AP® at Chattahoochee High School

- 819 students took 1692 AP exams last year
- 91.0% Pass rate across all of the exams taken (3 or higher);
 65.1% of exams taken achieved 4 or 5
- AP Scholars demonstrate superior college-level achievement through AP courses and exams. They receive an award certificate, and this achievement is acknowledged on any AP score report that is sent to colleges the following fall.
 - AP Scholar **134** students with average score of **3.36**
 - AP Scholar with Honor 76 students with average score of 3.64
 - AP Scholar with Distinction 163 students with average score 4.22
 - National AP Scholar 47 students with average score of 4.58

2017-18 Registration Process

Department Teachers have conversations with their current students and process recommendations (January)

Two courses have a separate application process (AP Capstone- Seminar Course and AP Computer Science Principles – by end of January)

Students Receive Verifications and can Elect to take AP if not recommended if district placement guidelines are met (requires parent and student signature and agreement with responsibilities on the verification form) (February)

Serious consideration should be given by the student and the parent to elect into an AP course if not recommended.

Registration is based upon space availability. Some courses may not actually "make" if a minimum number of students are not registered.





Guidelines

- A healthy progression for AP generally follows a sequential process of adding 1 AP course per year. Students should normally avoid adding 2 or more additional AP courses from their current load.
- 2. The rigors of AP at Chattahoochee are real and designed to challenge students at a level at least equal to the average state university or better. Students should have the motivation as well as the academic preparedness to successfully navigate the challenge of AP.
- Students should be mindful of graduation requirements and curricular expectations by grade level at CHS and plan accordingly to make space for additional course offerings desired.





AP® Myths & Realities

Myth	Reality
AP courses are for students who always get good grades.	AP courses are for any students who are academically prepared and motivated to take college-level courses.
AP courses are too stressful.	It's no secret that AP courses are challenging. But the support you receive from your classmates and teachers can help you manage the work load.
I don't think I will score high enough on the AP Exam to get college credit.	You don't need to score a 5. Many colleges grant credit — and placement as well — based on a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.
Taking AP courses could hurt my GPA.	Taking AP courses shows colleges that you're willing to challenge yourself academically. Fulton County awards 7 honors points for passed AP courses.
I can't take AP because no one has recommended me.	If you think you're ready to take an AP course, then you're ready to advocate for yourself — just talk to a teacher or counselor.
