FOOTBALL TEAM WINS BIG

■ The Westlake Football team begins the 2015 - 2016 football season with a convincing 69 - 0 win against Banneker High School. Return to Glory Phase III kicks into gear as players set high expectations for the upcoming year.

ATLANTA - On Friday night, the Westlake football team proved themselves a force to be reckoned with by beating Banneker High School 69 to 0 at Banneker.

Westlake successfully rode a high-powered offense led by quarterback Josh Jones and the three-headed monster at running back of Kristen Griffin, Justin Broughton, and Marquez Burdette, but it was perhaps Westlake's defense that set the tone.

Westlake felt an early hiccup, when on the first play of the game, Banneker intercepted a deep

pass and made a long run back.

The next play, however, Westlake's defense forced a fumble, and Christon Abrocrombie picked up that fumble for a touchdown, which recovered the momentum for Westlake, who never again let it go.

The defense scooped and scored three times in the first half thanks to the heroics of seniors Jarrod Jones, Christon Abrocrombie, and Jordan Mattox.

This means that 21 points of Westlake's total 69 came from the defense recovering fumbles and returning them for

touchdowns.

During the scrimmage the week before, Westlake had taken back a kickoff and made an interception for a touchdown, but this was a new height.

"I think in the years that I have coached, I have seen defenses score twice in a half, but to have three scoop-and-scores in a half, I haven't seen that," said Coach Alan Gordon.

Coach Gordon attributed the defensive successes to high expectations, as well as how the players work together as a unit.

"We're pretty hard on

the kids. Our level of acceptance is pretty high. Our team generally tries to please the coaches, and they have a tight bond, so they want to please each other."

The defense also accomplished one of its weekly goals by sustaining a shutout against Banneker.

This is particularly impressive because many starters were resting by halftime, so a new crop of players had the responsibility and pressure to keep the shutout alive through the second half.

Westlake's second half players proved

themselves gloriously, showing their thorough training, supreme focus, and personal hunger.

Coach Love made an effort to get everyone into the game, and by all accounts, Westlake was able to play all the 70 plus students who dressed out for the game.

This will go a long way to building depth on the team, which will prove vital later in the year during critical games.

Often, during the first game of the season, teams might have rust or look unfocused, but not this Westlake team.

The helmets were strapped on tight, the hits

came hard and frequent, and the crowd showed up in strong numbers to start the year off right.

Even though it was technically an away game, the Westlake stands were filled, the band was loud, and the cheerleaders and dancers were spirited, so it felt almost like a home game for the players on the field.

Next weekend, Westlake takes on Shiloh, a team that beat us last year 14-7, so Westlake is ready to vanquish a dragon and keep the momentum rolling.

ESSAY LEADS TO NYC WEEKEND

ATLANTA - Over the weekend, the Westlake tennis community said bon voyage to student-athlete Camille Quick, who earned a free trip to New York City as a reward for stellar essay writing.

That's right. Camille, who is best known for her outstanding performance on the tennis court, netted a free weekend in New York City by

writing an essay!

Specifically, Camille is the 15-16 year old age group winner of the Arthur Ashe Essay Contest, a national competition that encourages young tennis players to identify a community hero and explain how that hero has positively affected their lives.

Camille, who wrote about her coach Sam Kennedy, found herself in New York City from

August 28th to 30th.

On Saturday, August 29th, Camille participated in the 2015 Arthur Ashe Kids' Day, a large event that includes tennis challenges, balloon making, juggling, and concerts hosted by Radio Disney.

Past performers for the Arthur Ashe Kids' Day concerts have included Shawn Mendes, Ariana Grande, Ne-Yo, Demi Lovato, Justin Bieber, Rihanna, Fifth Harmony, Hunter Hayes, The Wanted, Carly Rae Jepsen, Jonas Brothers, Britney Spears, Backstreet Boys, and Hanson.

While in New York, Camille also stayed at the Grand Hyatt Hotel, saw a Broadway play, and attended a special luncheon hosted by former NYC mayor David Dinkins, the first and only African-American to hold this position.

Camille's impressive

trip was sponsored by the Arthur Ashe Learning Center, a foundation left behind by the late tennis star and humanitarian.

Arthur Ashe became an essay-worthy national hero in the 1960's and 1970's as he broke barriers in the tennis world by becoming a successful black athlete in a majority white sport.

Ashe, who was ranked top three several times in career, became the first African-American male to win a Grand Slam tournament and finished his career with three Grand Slam titles, including the 1968 U.S. Open.

Ashe also made huge contributions off the court, and his essay competition's website fittingly lists him as a "social activist taking on issues like racial prejudice, AIDS, apartheid and education."

Specifically, Ashe

used his position as a tennis player to put pressure on the racist restrictions on athletics in South Africa and later joined a delegation to South Africa to monitor changes to apartheid.

Furthermore, Ashe's three volume book, *A Hard Road to Glory: A History of the African-American Athlete*, is often cited as one of the most influential books about the intersection of race and athletics.

For these accomplishments, Ashe was a posthumous recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Our own Camille has been identified by Ashe's program as a future youth leader who can make a similar impact on the tennis court and on the world.

While Ashe's legacy makes for big shoes to fill, the purpose of Camille's trip is New York

City is to reward the steps she and her coach have already taken to making the world a better place.

Hopefully, the experience will serve as inspiration for Camille to continue her good work and one day mentor someone as her coach has done.

When Camille returns to Atlanta, we will sit down with her and chronicle her trip to New York City as well as ask for tips on how to write such extraordinary essays!

MS. COOK EXPLAINS SCHOOL PROCEDURES

ATLANTA - Thank you for wonderful first weeks of school! Here are a few reminders and updates:

1. Doors open at 7:45 AM for students. Please do not drop students off before this time, as there is no staff supervision until that time.

2. Upon arrival, students will report to either the Cafeteria or Main Gymnasium until 8:05 AM.

3. After 8:05 AM, students may visit their lockers and report to their first class of the day. Students who report after 8:20 AM will be marked Tardy to school.

4. As schedule changes are made, an updated schedule will be delivered to students in their class. Students are to follow their schedule as printed.

5. This week, students will have class meetings during school to address academic and behavioural expectations and other information pertinent to their grade level.

6. Dismissal is at 3:30 PM. All students should either ride their respective buses or leave school via personal automobile no later than 4:00 PM.

7. Students who drive to school must have a Parking Pass or risk having their vehicle towed.

MR. ROBINSON DISCUSSES TARDY POLICY

ATLANTA -At the beginning of the school year, all students could use a review of the tardy policy. Here is what you need to know.

SUMMARY

All students are expected to be in class on time. All hallways and student areas will be swept once the bell rings to ensure that students are in class on time.

Once the bell rings, a student who is not in the classroom is tardy. Tardy students will be allowed into class after being marked tardy by their teacher.

Students who do not report to class within the first ten minutes will be considered skipping.

Teachers will not accept students into the classroom after ten minutes.

Instead, students ten or more minutes late will report to room 307 to receive an immediate discipline consequence.

CONSEQUENCES

Frequent tardies will result in progressive discipline per the tardy guidelines outlined in the student handbook.

1-3 Tardies = Warning. Teacher will contact parent.

4 Tardies = Tuesday Detention. Teacher/Administrator will contact parent.

6 Tardies = Tuesday and Thursday Detention. Teacher / Administrator will contact parent.

8 Tardies = Saturday Detention. Teacher / Administrator will contact parent. Saturday Detention will be assigned and a tardy contract implemented with parent

10+ Tardies = Administration will review / revise the tardy contract and ISS will be assigned.

EXPECTATIONS

Students will attend all classes on time.

Students will follow the tardy protocol implemented in each classroom.

Students will report to 307 and then to class in a timely fashion.

Students will report to and accept all discipline consequences as assigned.

Students will reduce the number of tardy infractions per 9 week period.

TESTING CORNER

STUDENTS CAN TEST-OUT
OF COURSES WITH END-OF-
COURSE TESTS

Ms. Oliver discusses the pros and cons of this opportunity.

ATLANTA - Greetings, Again this school year, students will have the opportunity to "test-out" of any course for which there is an associated End-of-Course (EOC) test and earn credit for that course.

Eligible students may participate in the administration of an EOC prior to enrolling in and taking the course, and if he or she scores at the "Distinguished Learner" level on the EOC, he or she will be awarded credit for that course.

Students must have a "B" average in their current course related to the EOC they will take to "test-out;" a counselor's signature of verification of this information is needed on the application.

There is a \$50 fee associated with each EOC test for which a student desires to "test-out," and a student may only "test-out" of up to three EOC subjects.

Students who meet the eligibility criteria and score in the Distinguished Learner range will receive a reimbursement of the fee.

Students who earn course credit by testing out and scoring in the "Distinguished Learner" range on the EOC will not have the opportunity

to take the course or the retake EOC to improve their course grade at a future time.

The EOC score will be recorded on the transcript as the final course grade.

This may impact class ranking and HOPE calculations.

If the student attempts the EOC and does not score at the Exceeds performance level, the student must take the course within their regular course of study.

This student would again take the EOC at the conclusion of that course experience regardless of their score during their attempt to test-out.

Test-Out applications are available in the front office and the deadline for submission of complete applications is Friday, September 4th.

The EOC Test-Out administration dates are September 21-23, 2015.

Another Test-Out opportunity is offered in the Spring semester during the month of March.

To learn more about Ms. Forrest, please read the following interview.

How do you feel about joining the Westlake staff?

I love Westlake. It has been a breath of fresh air being here. I love being part of the Westlake family.

What have you noticed about the students?

I noticed that the students are very disciplined, eager to learn, and ready to solve problems. As a Physics and Chemistry teacher, that is a welcomed thing. They're analytical and ready for challenges.

What have you taught in the past?

This is my 14th year in the classroom, and I've taught Physics, Engineering, Chemistry, and Calculus.

What are some of your highlights of your 14 years of teaching?

The best thing about teaching is having students come back after they have gone to college.

I have some now who are out of college, and now they are in a scientific career or they are teaching.

I have one student named Jamal, and he is entering into his first year of teaching. I've been talking to him all summer and getting him ready for his classroom.

He actually expressed to me in high school that he wanted to be a teacher. I encouraged him with that.

It's just great to see that he's going to be a middle school teacher.

Do you have any other former students who are teaching?

I have two other students who are teaching high school.

One is teaching biology and the other is teaching chemistry.

I also have three other students who are now in Teachers Ed programs and are still in school.

So are you a college for teachers yourself that produces future teachers?

Yes! In my previous classes, I had the students actually teach. The students had to teach middle and elementary school students, and that's how they got a taste for teaching.

With this other stu-

dent named Lindsey, I told her, "You really have a gift for teaching. You should really do it. You got it girl. You should do it."

And now, she's a middle school teacher. Both her and Jamal claimed they were thinking about it for the future, and now they're teachers.

I'm so proud of them. To see other students go on to be engineers or biochemists. To see students excel, whether it is a science related field, college, or the military, that's the greatest joy I could have.

Can Westlake look forward to you continuing this tradition of having high schoolers teach the elementary and middle schools?

Yes, I would I love to do that, to get in contact with our feeder schools and establish a relationship with them.

It's a win win. I think it helps the younger kids because they look forward of seeing the high school kids and it helps reinforce the content for the high school students.

The high school students also end up saying, "I didn't know how hard teaching is!"

Any particular accolades for you throughout your teaching career?

I have been part of the Woodrow Wilson Program that helps select and mentor new teachers. A lot of people are second career and decide that they want to go into teaching.

Ms. Bolden, now I have to be honest. I know you have been Teacher of the Year, but you are too humble to say so.

Yes. I have been Teacher of the Year at my old school.

(Ms. Bolden did not elaborate on her experience as teacher of the year and instead changed the subject to



the success of others.)

Tell us a bit about your educational philosophy.

I feel like teaching is a calling. That's the way I embrace it, and I want to see every student excel in whatever they want to do, in whatever facet of life they want to go into. That's my philosophy.

Is there anything else you would like to share with the Westlake Community about what makes you you?

Part of what makes me who I am is my background.

I came from a poor, single parent home in North Carolina, and my grandfather was a tobac-

co farmer who could not read or write.

I was the first person in my family to attend college, and at Johnson C Smith University, I double majored in Chemistry and Physics.

Then I was given an amazing opportunity to study Education and Divinity at Princeton, where I graduated in 2007.

I include this information because I believe that students need to see that anything is possible.

WHS PRODUCES SCIENCE PROJECTS AT GEORGIA TECH

STUDENTS PLAN HOW TO RECORD BIKE TRAFFIC

ATLANTA - Traveling by bike is becoming more popular in Atlanta with the introduction of the Silver Comet Trail and Beltline, but cyclists still face danger on the busy city streets that they share with cars.

In order to ensure Atlanta adapts to its rapidly growing cyclist population, bikers must be tallied, recorded, and measured.

A system for finding out how many cyclists are on the road does not current exist, but that did

not deter Westlake students.

In order to correct the situation, juniors Johnathan Johnson and Xavier Maldonado created the Bicycle Recognition Sensor.

"Basically, we made a camera using a Raspber-

ry Pi and programmed the camera to automatically distinguish bicycles from motor vehicles," Johnathan explained.

Once bicycles and cars are distinguished, the computer software will tally the number of bikes that pass on a given day.

Thus, Jonathan and Xavier's sensor is on the verge of improving the structure of roads and providing safer transportation for both cyclists and motorists.

A project of this caliber could have an impact on modern society and requires highly skilled students, so we at Westlake are extremely proud of the participants' accomplishments, as well as the reputation they provided for Westlake.
